Largest Pacific Estuary in Americas

Touches 9 counties

Average depth of 12-15 feet deep

~400-mile shoreline

Fresh water from Sacramento & San Joaquin Rivers

Dungeness crab, striped shore crab, yellow shore crab, and Chinese mitten crab

Home to over 1,000 species of plants and animals

Largest US Estuary (8x larger than SF Bay)

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

Mission Rock Utility District

- Designed to integrate bay water exchange system to reduce carbon and conserve millions of gallons of water per year
- 100% carbon-free electricity, coupled with bay water energy capture
- 1,600 tons of CO2 savings per year
- 64,000 gallons of black water recycled per day for non-potable purposes such as irrigation and toilet flushing
- 43,000 gallons of potable water saved per day

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Street Naming

DR. MAYA ANGELOU LANE

Reaching from the park into the Mission Rock development, Bridgeview Way and Dr. Maya Angelou Lane Paseos are pedestrian-only streets abutting The Canyon, the Visa building, Toni Stone Crossing, and the future Parcel K. Incorporating the retail frontage of adjacent buildings, native planting, and seating areas, the paseos also act as a public gathering space for the southeastern half of the park.

TONI STONE CROSSING


Three street rooms – interactive public art installations designed by local artists – dot Mission Rock’s streets to enhance the pedestrian experience. An urban gazebo called “Garden Party”, a 3D mosaic of stone named “Pop Rocks”, and a sculptural multi-use table called “Urban Table” will be installed along Dr. Maya Angelou Lane, named for the celebrated author, poet, actress, dancer and civil rights activist who moved to California as a teenager. A bronze sculpture of Toni Stone is now installed on Toni Stone Crossing, which is named in honor of the first woman to break professional baseball’s gender barrier with the San Francisco Sea Lions.

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
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

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
