Dear Maryland Economic Development Partners,

I'm once again pleased to introduce the Maryland Economic Development Association's 2024-2025 Year in Review, detailing the remarkable achievements of Maryland's economic development community over the past year.

In these unprecedented times, Maryland is being tested by two storms: An historic fiscal challenge – the worst since the Great Recession – and a federal administration that continues to harm Maryland's people and the economy. But together, we are confronting crisis with courage.

In the coming year, our administration will remain laser-focused on making Maryland's economy stronger and more competitive. We will continue to attract new investment and jobs, and we will continue to create more pathways to work, wages, and wealth for all Marylanders.

Earlier this year, Commerce and the Maryland Economic Development Commission released "Winning the Decade: Roadmap to an Equitable, Robust, and Competitive Economy." 

The primary mission of the Public Policy Committee is to raise awareness among MEDA members regarding public policy issues that directly impact development, investment, and sustainable growth at both the state and local levels. In addition, the committee actively engages with elected and appointed officials to enhance their understanding of economic development and the profound influence of public policy in creating and preserving jobs in Maryland.

MEDA announced the release of updated impact data from its annual study of county economic development offices in Maryland. According to the findings, every dollar invested in county economic development operations over the past three fiscal years has generated an estimated average of \$8.81 in state and local tax revenue. The study, conducted in collaboration with BEACON at Salisbury University used IMPLAN, a regional economic analysis software, to model the data. This year's report draws on information from participating county offices for 2022, 2023, and 2024, focusing on jobs created or retained and the funding each county invested in economic development operations.

The committee organized a successful Economic Development Day in Annapolis, which took place in February. This event provided a valuable opportunity for MEDA members to convene in Annapolis and engage with legislators.
